
Second Sunday of Lent

	Fanny Mendelssohn, the composer of today's postlude, was regarded by her parents to be more talented than her brother Felix. However, neither Felix nor their father would give Fanny permission to publish or perform her music, as they felt that music could be only "an adornment, never a basis for a career" for a woman. Felix did publish, under his own name, music Fanny wrote, and he performed her works in his solo piano recitals. Although in 1846 he finally did give his approval for Fanny to publish some compositions, her professional music career was short-lived. She died in May 1847, at the age of forty-one.
