Without abandoning all hope that things may yet take a turn for the better, I must now write you a Christmas letter. We shall both experience a few dark hours. . . . We shall be assailed by questions of why . . . and then, just when everything is bearing down on us, the Christmas message comes. Our eyes are at fault, that is all. God is in the manger, wealth in poverty, light in darkness, succor in abandonment. No evil can befall us. . . . Christ is with us. Dearest Maria, let us celebrate Christmas in that way. Don't entertain any imaginings of me in my cell, but remember that Christ, too, frequents prisons, and that he will not pass me by.



Worship Notes

- **The Advent banners**, in the form of wings, convey the idea of Advent stillness and of waiting in the presence of angels. They were designed and painted by Eliza Linely of Berkeley, California.
- The stewardship banners hanging in the sanctuary are revealed as member pledges are received, indicating our communal pledge to be a light in the city through the mission and ministries of Fourth Church. These cityscape banners were designed for the Stewardship 2003 campaign by liturgical artist Nancy Chinn.
- **Tower Brass**, which regularly assists in 9:30 and 11:00 worship on the third Sunday of the month, will instead be in worship next Sunday to accompany the Christmas cantata *Gloria* by Dan Locklair.
- **The hymn "Come, Thou Long-Expected Jesus"** was authored by the Reverend Charles Wesley, who was ordained both a deacon and a priest in the Church of England. A personal conversion experience in 1738 gave him "rest in his soul" that released in him the grist for hymn writing. Dedicating his life to the Methodist movement, he is known to have authored more than 6,000 hymns.
