A NOTE ON HOLY WEEK AND ANTISEMITISM

The Passion texts can pose problems for Christian-Jewish relations. For centuries, many Christians blamed "The Jews" for Christ's death. This interpretation is incorrect, misguided, and dangerous. In fact, crucifixion was solely a Roman form of punishment, one used to frighten subjugated peoples into obeying Roman authority. Tragically, Christians have misused the reading of the Passion to foment violent antisemitic pogroms. Antisemitism still plagues the world. We read these texts with sensitivity and caution, remembering the cruelties and failures of our past. reconciliation, and justice.

This evening we gather for a 6:30 p.m. **Maundy Thursday Tenebrae** service with Communion. The service follows the ancient Office of Tenebrae (*from the Latin for "shadows"*) and portrays the progression from light to darkness in the passion of Jesus, beginning with his abandonment on Thursday and concluding with his crucifixion. The service ends with the Sanctuary in complete darkness. The Tenebrae service will be **livestreamed** on our YouTube channel (*www.bit.ly/fpcvideos*).



Tomorrow we will observe **Good Friday** with a Good Friday service at 12:10 p.m. in the Sanctuary; a 5:30 p.m. program in Buchanan Chapel for children and families; and a 6:30 p.m. **Choral Service**, which will conclude with the tolling of the bells thirty-three times, one for each year of Jesus' life on earth. The 6:30 p.m. choral service will be **livestreamed** on YouTube (*www.bit.ly/fpcvideos*). ***** On Saturday we will hold an **Easter Vigil** at 7:00 p.m. (*in person only*). Beginning with kindling a fire in the courtyard, we will move into the Sanctuary, where we will hear readings that cover the story of salvation, from creation through redemption, and join in sacred song.



We hope you will join us **Easter Sunday** for our joyous celebration of the resurrection! We gather for four services: **6:30 a.m. Sunrise Service** with Communion at Oak Street Beach; **9:30 and 11:30 a.m. Easter services** in the Sanctuary; and **2:00 p.m. Easter "The Gathering: Communion at 2:00."** (*Note that the second morning service in the Sanctuary begins a half hour later than usual to accommodate the number of worshipers*). The 9:30 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. services will be **livestreamed** on YouTube (*www.bit.ly/fpcvideos*), with the morning prelude beginning at approximately 9:15 a.m. and the service available for viewing anytime after that. **Those without Internet access** are invited to listen live via phone to the 9:30 service by calling 888.916.9166 at the time of the service.

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Entrance for the 9:30 and 11:30 a.m. Easter services will be through the glass Loggia doors on next to the courtyard on Michigan Avenue.
