Soloists: Elizabeth Hedgcock, soprano; Brian Rittenhouse, tenor
 Leo Sowerby stands alone as America's foremost composer of organ and liturgical music. During the 1930s and 1940s, he was also among the most often performed symphonic composers. His intensely personal and highly individual style brought forth compelling, powerful, daring, and original music. Sowerby was born in 1895, and after serving in the Army during World War I, he became Associate Organist at Fourth Presbyterian Church. In 1927, he became organist and choirmaster at St. James Church, which later became St. James Cathedral. At his death in 1968, America lost one of its finest composers, church music one of its greatest exponents, and Chicago an old and dear friend.
