The music for the Doxology, sung by generations of Christians every Sunday, is attributed to Louis Bourgeois (c. 1510 - c. 1561). Bourgeois was a follower of John Calvin in Geneva and was concerned with singing the Psalms. In 1545 Bourgeois was paid to perform the Psalms and teach the choristers at St. Pierre's Church. The next year he worked with the city pastors to derive the list of psalms to be sung at worship. He worked to improve psalm tunes but, ironically was imprisoned for having "changed the tunes of some printed psalms" without a license, a disturbing action to those who had learned the "old tunes" already printed. The personal intervention of Calvin the next day got him released from prison. Later these alterations to the tunes were accepted and published in Geneva.
