	Soloists: Elizabeth Hedgcock, soprano; Brian Rittenhouse, tenor William Billings, a musician unrivaled in his day for spirit and originality, justly earned the title of America's leading eighteenth-century composer. Born in Boston in 1746 of humble parents, he was apprenticed as a tanner. As a young man, he scribbled music on animal hides with chalk and before long hung out a shingle reading "Billings Music." In 1770, the year of Beethoven's birth, Billings produced what has been called a "musical declaration of independence": <i>The</i> <i>New England Psalm Singer</i> . Naïve and full of vitality, this collection, engraved in Boston by Paul Revere, broke with the traditional English psalm books used in America since the publication of the <i>Bay Psalm Book</i> in 1640. It presented a style that was Billings's own. Billings was the father of American church choirs, a teacher and composer whose work provided the spark that set America's dormant musical life going. He died in Boston in 1800.
