Twenty-three-year-old Julius Reubke (1834-1858) premiered his final work, "Organ Sonata based on Psalm 94," in 1857. Prior to this monumental work, he had written one small organ composition and a piano sonata. Reubke had become immersed in the German romantic school, studying piano and composition with Franz Liszt, and thus the organ sonata has many similarities with the Lisztian style of composition. His sonata seeks to express with strength and power the ideas and emotions conveyed by the words of Psalm 94.

Sunday School Teachers Needed

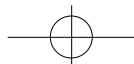

Space Available on Trip to Germany

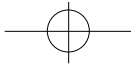

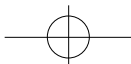
