
Twelfth Sunday after Pentecost

He brought recognition to Fourth Church through his own status as an acclaimed organist, composer, director, and critic as well as through the music program that he shaped. It was DeLamarter who began the Morning Choir in 1914 to sing in Fourth Church's new sanctuary on Michigan Avenue. In 1917, he became assistant conductor of the Chicago Symphony Orchestra and also worked with the Civic

Orchestra.
