The tune dates back much earlier, however. It was published twice in 1580, once by Richard Jones, with the title "A New Northerne Dittye of the Lady Greene Sleeves," and once by Edward White, using the title "A ballad, being the Ladie Greene Sleeves Answer to Donkyn his friende." William Shakespeare speaks of the ballad through two of the characters in <i>The Merry Wives of Windsor</i> . In act 2, scene 1, as Mistresses Ford and Page compare love letters, Mistress Ford shows hers and states, "I would have sworn his disposition would have gone to the truth of his words; but they do no more adhere and keep place together than the Hundredth Psalm to the tune of 'Green Sleeves.'" In act 5, scene 5, Falstaff says, "Let the sky rain potatoes; let it thunder to the tune of 'Green Sleeves.'" One of Greensleeves early appearances as a hymn tune was in 1642, as a setting for the text "The Old Year Now Is Fled."
