His influence gave rise to Calvinism and the development of the Reformed faith throughout the world.

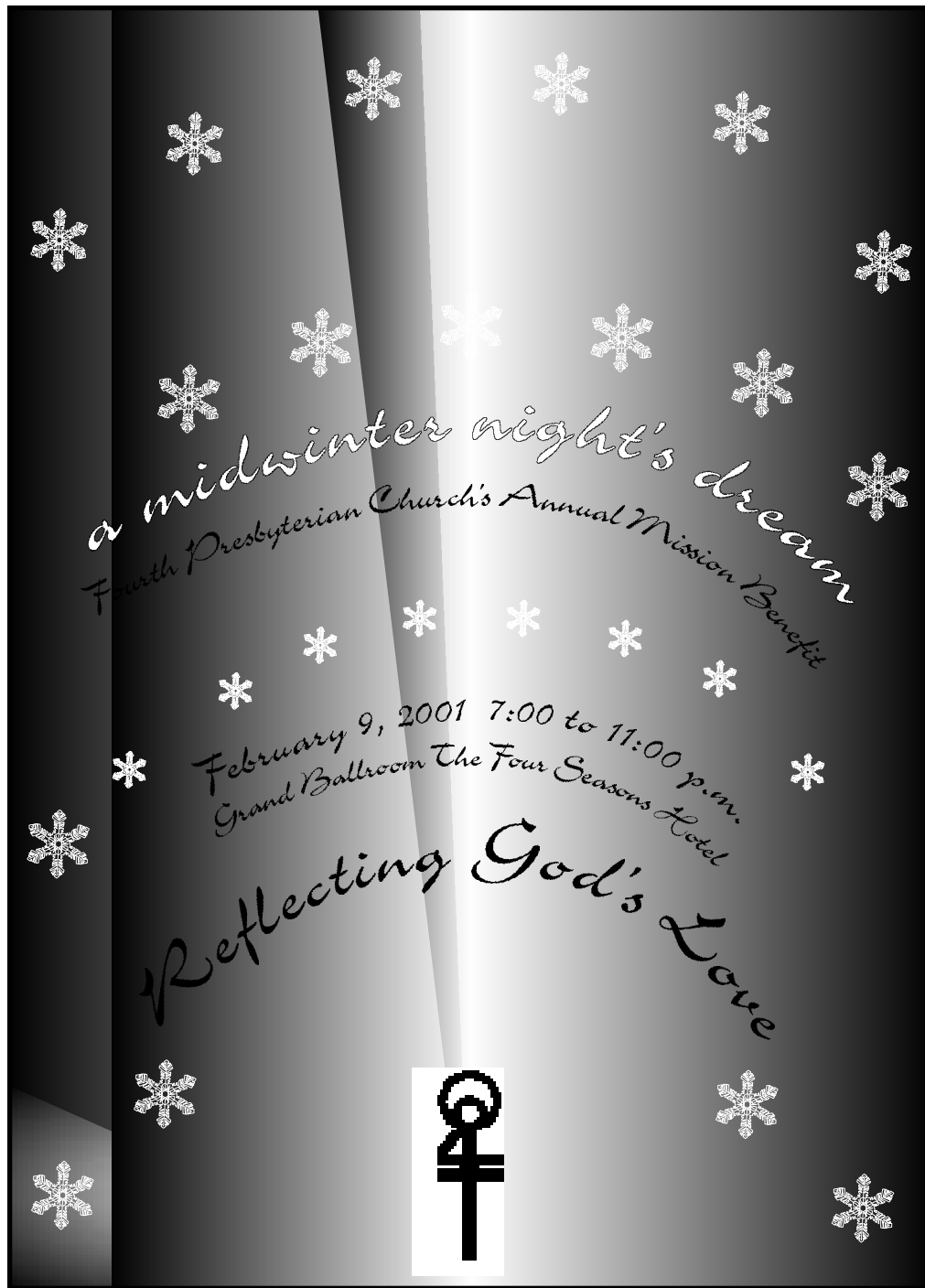
