

Candlelight Vigil Tonight for Healing and Reconciliation of Families Affected by Violent Crime



- > Signatures are being collected during Coffee Hour for the Death Sentence 2000 Resolution. Those interested can stop by the Advocacy Table to sign this resolution stating that all human lives, without exception, are sacred and thus the death penalty should be eliminated.
