Originally written for the oratorio Joshua in 1748, it was used again in Handel's oratorio *Judas Maccabeus* in 1751. In *Judas Maccabeus*, it was the setting for the text "See, the conquering hero comes." In 1760, the music was first published as a hymn tune, as the setting for Charles Wesley's text "Christ the Lord Is Risen Today!" which is Hymn 113 in The Presbyterian Hymnal.
