REACHING AROUND THE WORLD

Fourth Church's Support of Mission Work in Albania



Two years ago this June, Fourth Church members Bob and Dalia Baker accepted a call to become mission specialists of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), participating in the church's disaster relief work in Albania. They continue to serve in this poorest country in Europe, teaching in the mission school and working with government agencies and officials to allow Protestant/Evangelical mission workers to serve people in need.

In March of this year, another Fourth Church member Rebecca Steward joined the Bakers in the capital city, Tirana, having been commissioned as a mission volunteer to work for nine months in the mission school and the Albanian Encouragement Office.

Sixteen people from Fourth Church will join Bob, Dalia, and Rebecca for a week later this summer, traveling to Tirana to rehab a childcare center and install playground equipment at a school for those who have handicaps.



This outreach in Albania is but one of the many ways in which Fourth Church actively supports and engages in the mission work of the church.
