



Today is World

Communion Sunday, a day when Christians around the world gather to celebrate the Lord's Supper. As part of this celebration of Christian unity, John Buchanan is preaching this morning at First Presbyterian Church in Havana, Cuba. He is joined there by sixteen other staff and members of Fourth Presbyterian Church, as they learn more about First Presbyterian Church and the Presbytery of Havana.

A Peacemaking Offering is being received today by Fourth Church and other Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) congregations. This offering supports the peacemaking efforts of the church at local, national, and international levels. A portion of the offering received at Fourth Church will be given to Partners in Education programs for their work toward racial reconciliation. To make a gift to this offering, use one of the special envelopes in the pew racks or write "Peacemaking Offering" on the memo line of a check made payable to Fourth Presbyterian Church.

Fourth Church welcomes Dirk Ficca as guest preacher at this evening's Vespers. An ordained Presbyterian minister, Mr. Ficca is currently Executive Director of the Council for a Parliament of the World's

Religions, a nonprofit, nonsectarian organization fostering interreligious encounter, dialogue, and cooperative action in metropolitan Chicago and around the world.

The newly reled west stained-glass window in the chancel, above the choir loft, is in the process of being reinstalled after having been removed this summer for upkeep and repair.

The banners in the Sanctuary were designed and created by Nancy Chinn, of Oakland, California, for this year's stewardship season, which begins this month. As pledges are received, the blue covering will be cut away to reveal a painting based on the windows located in the nave of the church. A weekly design will also be revealed as the diamonds are removed. Many of the images from the nave windows have been included in the banners. Toward the end of the 2002 stewardship season, look for a list of all the designs included, their locations in the nave, and their meanings.

The exhibit "Visions of Christ," on display in the Loggia and Gallery, features various depictions of Christ by artists from around the world. This exhibit continues through Sunday, October 28.

The exhibit "Sunshine from Darkness," on display in Anderson Hall in conjunction with Mental Health Awareness Month, features works of accomplished artists who also have a mental illness. Organized by the National Alliance for Research on Schizophrenia and Depression (NARSAD), this exhibit continues through October.
