

Music Note: "O Morning Star, How Fair and Bright," Hymn 69 in *The Presbyterian Hymnal*, is the hymn tune heard in today's prelude and postlude. This hymn was written by Philipp Nicolai (1556-1608), a pastor in Unna, Germany. At the time he wrote it, an unknown "pestilence" had spread so broadly that in seven months 1300 people had died. The pastor's home overlooked a cemetery where up to thirty bodies were buried daily. These events led him to seek comfort in Christ and in the hope of eternal life. One morning there welled forth from the inmost depths of his heart "this precious hymn of the Savior's love and of the joys of heaven."
