Music Notes: Jehan Alain (1911-1940) wrote today's postlude, "Litanies," in 1937, three years before his death in World War II. Alain, who devoted his life to composing, wrote nearly 103 works. Some remarks he jotted in one of his notebooks reflect well his attitude toward composition: "Music is created to translate the states of the soul at some time, some moment, above all, the evolution of a soul state. Thus mobility is essential. Do not try to translate an individual emotion. . . . What matters in music is perhaps less charm than mystery."
