Christ saves us simply by being God with us. The cross represents the culmination of the incarnation: divinity fully united with humanity. . . . Therefore, nothing that can happen to us—no pain, no humiliation, no journey into a far country or even into the valley of the shadow of death—can "separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord" (Romans 8:39). The cross shows that in Christ God is with us, no matter what. Even when we doubt or disbelieve or think ourselves completely cut off from God, Christ has been there before us. Christ is, as the philosopher Alfred North Whitehead said of God, "the great companion—the fellow sufferer who understands."
