The community that hopes is a community that will have something to say to humankind, no matter what humanity's religious inclinations of the moment may be. That community, however, must have a genuine hope—not a cheap hope, not mere optimism and coffee-hour chattiness. It must have a foundation in the very ground rock of creation, and in the promises and acts of Earth's Creator.
