

Music Note: The banners and pulpit parament celebrate Ordinary Time, the season of the church year that falls between Epiphany and Lent and between Pentecost and Advent. These hangings, created by Laurie Wohl, are intended to elevate the perception of the sacred in the "ordinary" as we make our faith journey day to day.

This morning's offertory anthem, "O Light, from Age to Age the Same," was written by Leo Sowerby in 1936 to honor the 65th anniversary of the founding of Fourth Church. Sowerby (1895-1968), who also wrote this morning's prelude and first anthem, was one of America's most influential church musicians and was twice the Associate Organist of Fourth Church. He began at Fourth Church in May of 1921 but left in December of that year after becoming the first American to win the Prix de Rome, which allowed him to study music in Rome for three years. After returning to Chicago in 1924, he again became Associate Organist at Fourth Church until in 1926 he went to St. James Church (now Cathedral) just a few blocks away.
