

Worship Note: The hymn sung at all services today, "Our God, Our Help in Ages Past," is a paraphrase of Psalm 90 and was written by Isaac Watts (1674-1748). As a boy, Watts's literary genius was evident not only in the verses he wrote but also in a rather annoying habit: rhyming everyday conversation. Scolded by his father one day for this practice, he cried out, "O Father, do some pity take and I will no more verses make." Early on, Watts was concerned about the low ebb of music in the churches, and for two years he wrote a new hymn text every Sunday. Because of his bold departure from the traditional psalms to the inclusion of "hymns of human composure," Watts, in his day, was generally considered to be a radical. Now he has come to be considered the father of English hymnody.
