

Worship Notes: "O God, Thou Faithful God" is one of eleven chorale preludes Johannes Brahms wrote for the organ just before his death in 1897. This particular work combines his skill at writing for the organ with his heartfelt compositional style. This simple but profound work evokes faith in God and the offering of oneself to God just as the Canaanite women offered herself (Matthew 15:21-28). Like her, the listener longs to hear the message, "Great is your faith! Let it be done for you as you wish."

The banners and pulpit parament celebrate Ordinary Time, the season of the church year that falls between Epiphany and Lent and between Pentecost and Advent. These hangings, created by Laurie Wohl, are intended to elevate the perception of the sacred in the "ordinary" as we make our faith journey day to day.
