

September 8, 2002 *Sixteenth Sunday After Pentecost*

The tasks presented to the churches by September 11 remain unfinished. Churches need to continue to develop a theology of the religions that is ecumenical in spirit but also recognizes complexities and oppositions. The churches should enter conversations with other faith communities about common challenges. . . . The events call for realistic theological interpretations of what people are capable of doing. . . . September 11 also offers reasons to hope for renewed possibilities and communities—the routinely heroic performances of firefighters, police, government officials. . . . Now is not the time either to celebrate or lament the churches’ responses. It is time to sustain theological discourse and reflection informed by renewed attention to some classic themes: human nature, the persistence of human fault, and irrepressible grace.



Worship Notes: The text for the morning hymn "When All the World Is Wounded" was written by Rae Whitney (© 2001 Selah Publishing Co.; reprinted by permission). It is part of the Hymn Society's "Songs of Remembrance: Hymns for the Commemoration of September 11, 2001," a collection of hymns written after September 11.

This morning's prelude, "Prelude and Fugue in E-flat Major," was the only prelude and fugue by Bach to be published during his lifetime. The fugue is based on the hymn tune "St. Anne," which is commonly associated with the text "Our God, Our Help in Ages Past." This hymn first appeared in an English hymnal in 1708, about fifteen years before Bach borrowed it to be the subject of this grand fugue.

The banners and pulpit parament celebrate Ordinary Time, the season of the church year that falls between Epiphany and Lent and between Pentecost and Advent. These hangings, created by Laurie Wohl, are intended to elevate the perception of the sacred in the "ordinary" as we make our faith journey day to day.

BAPTISM AT FOURTH PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

*“Let the little children come to me . . .
for it is to such as these that the kingdom of heaven belongs.”
Matthew 19:14 (NRSV)*

On the second Sunday of each month, Fourth Church includes the Sacrament of Baptism in morning worship. Baptism is the sign and seal of God’s grace and covenant in Christ. As *The Book of Order* of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) explains, baptism signifies the faithfulness of God, the washing away of sin, rebirth, putting on the fresh garment of Christ, and adoption into the covenant family of the church.

The baptism of children witnesses to the truth that God’s love claims people before they are able to respond in faith. The congregation, on behalf of the whole church, assumes responsibility for nurturing the baptized children in the Christian life, and it is for this reason that the congregation makes such a promise during the service.

In the unison prayer we also remember that we too were baptized and as children of God are part of the worldwide family of faith.
