

Worship Notes

The stewardship banners hanging in the sanctuary are revealed as member pledges are received, indicating our communal pledge to be a light in the city through the mission and ministries of Fourth Church. These cityscape banners were designed for the Stewardship 2003 campaign by California-based liturgical artist Nancy Chinn.

Dieterich Buxtehude (1637-1707), organist of the Mariankirche in Lübeck from 1668 to 1707, wrote this morning's prelude "Come, Holy Spirit, Our Lord and God." His compositions constitute one of the most powerful influences on the musical style of Johann Sebastian Bach, who heard the works at a famous series of evening concerts organized by Buxtehude at Mariankirche in 1705.

Distinguished Pastor of Atlanta's Ebenezer Baptist Church, Joseph Roberts Jr., to Preach Next Sunday

Fourth Church will welcome the Reverend Dr. Joseph Roberts Jr. to its pulpit on Sunday, January 19 during 9:30 and 11:00 worship. A native of Chicago, Dr. Roberts held various positions within the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) before becoming Senior Pastor of the historic Ebenezer Baptist Church in Atlanta, Georgia. BAPTISM AT FOURTH PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

*“Let the little children come to me . . .
for it is to such as these that the kingdom of heaven belongs.”
Matthew 19:14 (NRSV)*

On the second Sunday of each month, Fourth Church includes the Sacrament of Baptism in morning worship. Baptism is the sign and seal of God’s grace and covenant in Christ. As *The Book of Order* of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) explains, baptism signifies the faithfulness of God, the washing away of sin, rebirth, putting on the fresh garment of Christ, and adoption into the covenant family of the church.

The baptism of children witnesses to the truth that God’s love claims people before they are able to respond in faith. The congregation, on behalf of the whole church, assumes responsibility for nurturing the baptized children in the Christian life, and it is for this reason that the congregation makes such a promise during the service.

In the unison prayer we also remember that we too were baptized and as children of God are part of the worldwide family of faith.
