Worship Notes

The bulletin cover features an unfolding flower growing out of a crown of thorns, which provides an apt metaphor for the new life arising from Christ's death and resurrection. This flower and crown of thorns is carved into the underside of the octagonal sounding board over the pulpit.

The composer of the prelude "Litany," Joel Martinson (b. 1960), teaches liturgy and church music at the University of North Texas in Denton. He is also Director of Music Ministries and Organist at St. Rita Catholic Community Church in Dallas, Texas. The sensitive and colorful writing evident in "Litany" demonstrates why critics praise Martinson as one of America's finest composers.
