

Worship Notes

The bulletin cover features an unfolding flower growing out of a crown of thorns, which provides an apt metaphor for the new life arising from Christ's death and resurrection. This flower and crown of thorns is carved into the underside of the octagonal sounding board over the pulpit.

The text of today's opening hymn, "All Glory, Laud, and Honor," was written by Theodulph, Bishop of Orleans, around the year 820 to be used as a Palm Sunday processional hymn. Although legend has it that Theodulph, imprisoned for conspiring against King Louis the Pious, was freed when the king passed the prison and heard him singing this hymn, it is more likely that Theodulph died in prison.

Baptism at Fourth Presbyterian Church

"Let the little children come to me . . . for it is to such as these that the kingdom of heaven belongs." Matthew 19:14 (NRSV)

On the second Sunday of each month, Fourth Church includes the Sacrament of Baptism in morning worship. Baptism is the sign and seal of God's grace and covenant in Christ. As *The Book of Order* of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) explains, baptism signifies the faithfulness of God, the washing away of sin, rebirth, putting on the fresh garment of Christ, and adoption into the covenant family of the church.

The baptism of children witnesses to the truth that God's love claims people before they are able to respond in faith. The congregation, on behalf of the whole church, assumes responsibility for nurturing the baptized children in the Christian life, and it is for this reason that the congregation makes such a promise during the service.

In the unison prayer we also remember that we too were baptized and as children of God are part of the worldwide family of faith.
