

#### **Worship Notes**

The hymn "Guide Me, O Thou Great Jehovah" was authored by the Welsh evangelist William Williams (1717–1791). For forty-three years, he traveled nearly 100,000 miles on horseback throughout Wales and was respected as a persuasive preacher and as the "sweet singer of Wales." Williams wrote the text for more than 800 hymns, all in Welsh, but this is the only hymn for which he is widely known today. It has since been translated into seventy-five languages.

The textile banners and pulpit parament, "Unweavings" created by Laurie Wohl, celebrate Ordinary Time, the season of the church year that falls between Epiphany and Lent and between Pentecost and Advent. They are intended to elevate the perception of the sacred in the "ordinary" as we make our faith journey day to day. More information about these hangings is available in the literature racks.

The Fourth Church stained-glass windows, depicted on the bulletin cover, were designed by Charles J. Connick of Boston. The north and south sanctuary windows were made in the thirteenth-century manner known as grisaille.
