Nineteenth Sunday After Pentecost

The former Archbishop of Canterbury, William Temple, told a story about two vandals who wanted to wreak havoc in a famous store. They broke in but didn't steal anything. They simply rearranged the price tags—putting a \$50 price tag on a \$5,000 item and a \$1,000 price tag on a \$50 item. In the morning, they watched with delight as shoppers were confused. God has put the highest value on items like faith, faithfulness, character, integrity, sacrifice, servanthood, and eternal life. A thief has come in and rearranged the price tags so that the things God said are worth the most in life are the things on which our society often places little value, and the things that have little value are the things on which our society places the highest value. Someone has rearranged the price tags, so that even though God says the highest good is *giving*, our society puts the highest price tag on *getting*.



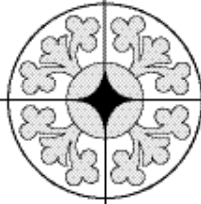
