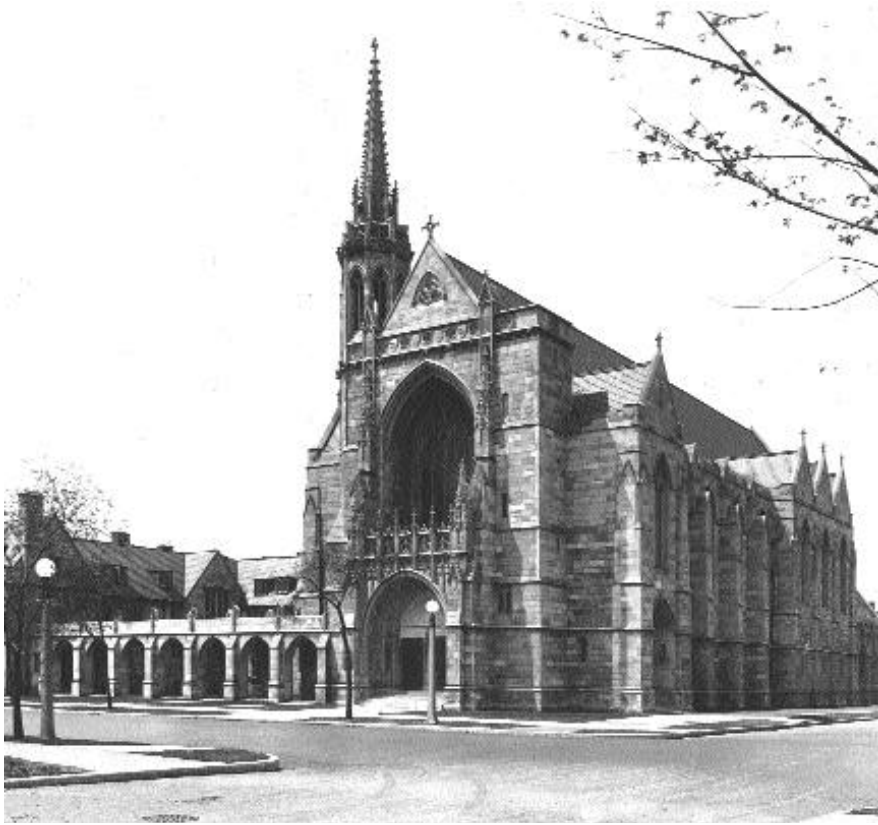

## Celebrating 90 Years on Michigan Avenue



This 1914 photograph of Fourth Presbyterian Church was taken shortly after the church was completed and dedicated.

On Sunday, May 10 of that year, the Fourth Church congregation worshiped in the Michigan Avenue sanctuary for the first time, having moved from its smaller facility on Rush at Superior. Preaching that Sunday was Fourth Church Pastor John Timothy Stone, who that year served as Moderator of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.).

A series of special dedicatory services were held throughout the remainder of that week, and later that month, the new sanctuary and parish buildings were host to 1,800 attendees and guests at the General Assembly of the PCUSA. *(A four-foot-long panoramic photo of those in attendance at the Assembly is on display in Anderson Hall.)*

### Worship Notes

This morning's processional hymn, "The Church's One Foundation," was the opening hymn for the Service of Dedication of the new building of the Fourth Presbyterian Church of Chicago on Sunday, May 10, 1914. The congregation also read Psalm 100, as we will this morning, and heard the anthem "Light of the World" by Edward Elgar, which is today's offertory anthem at 9:30 and 11:00. John Timothy Stone preached the sermon, "The Foundation Truth." Dr. Stone announced that "hereafter the third Sunday in May in each year shall be observed as Dedication Commemoration Sunday" (*from the Minutes of the Session, May 1914*).

The twelve-foot-wide tympanum over the Michigan Avenue entrance (shown on the bulletin cover) depicts Moses blessing the children of Israel as he was instructed by God in the book of Numbers ("The Lord bless thee and keep thee. . . ." Numbers 6:24-26). The text at the bottom of the carving, "The Master is here and calleth for thee," is taken from John 11:28, the words of Martha to Mary. More than eight million worshipers have passed under this carving since the sanctuary was dedicated in May 1914.

The special 90th Anniversary Offering supports Fourth Church's vision for the future, Project Light—in particular the refurbishing and releading of the 90-year-old stained glass windows. Tower Brass, Fourth Church's brass octet, assists in worship leadership this morning. Tower Brass will next participate in worship in September.
