Theologians through the centuries have been scandalized when they contemplate that the God who is omnipotent, omniscient, and omnipresent is incarnate in one person, with that person's particularities and limitations. This "scandal of particularity" . . . is nowhere more evident than in God's selection of Mary. God did not elect to be born of some woman but of a particular woman. . . . A particular woman gave of her humanity to the being of the God-human. The peasant woman nurtured, raised, trained, even shaped the personality of the One who is God.



BAPTISM AT FOURTH PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

On the second Sunday of each month, Fourth Church includes the Sacrament of Baptism in morning worship. Baptism is the sign and seal of God's grace and covenant in Christ.
