Worship Notes

- The architectural detail depicted on the bulletin cover shows the stone and ceiling vault ninety feet above the chancel and choir loft. Sculpted by Italian stone cutters during construction of Fourth Presbyterian Church in 1913, the carvings represent various branches of the Reformed family of churches.
- Composers César Franck (1822-1890) and Charles-Marie Widor (1844-1937) each worked in Paris, Franck at St. Clotilde and Widor at St. Sulpice. Today's prelude and postlude, early works for each composer, demonstrate the new and more expressive style of organ composition Franck and Widor initiated.
