

*PRESENTATION OF THE OFFERING AND RESPONSE





Two latest two banners in the Unweavings[®] series by Jewish fiber artist Laurie Wohl were installed earlier this month, on the hymnboard pillars roughly halfway back in the sanctuary. From a distance the banners look subtle and understated, but close-up inspection reveals a detailed symphony of colors, textures, lively figures, and polished beads.

The texts featured on the two newest banners are "O sing to the Lord a new song. . . . O worship the Lord in the beauty of holiness" (Psalm 96) and "There is a river, whose streams make glad the city of God" (Psalm 46).

Calligraphy—both English and Hebrew—is used in all of the hangings to augment the formal and pictographic narratives. The ancient biblical text and Hebrew language together convey a quality of timelessness and continuity of story, and the forms and arabesques in the Hebrew language contribute an art form in themselves. The English lettering style seen in the banners suggests the iconography in the transept ceilings of Fourth Church.

The use of Hebrew in the hangings also promotes the Christian–Jewish dialogue that continues between two congregations that share a close relationship: Fourth Presbyterian Church and Chicago Sinai Congregation. Chicago Sinai holds its High Holy Day services in the Fourth Church sanctuary, at which time the banners and parament are part of the worship setting.

Worship Notes

Fourth Church welcomes to worship this morning youth from the Presbyterian Church of Traverse City, Michigan, who have been working on the Chicago Avenue Community Garden this weekend.

Today's Minute for Mission is presented by Polly Toner on behalf of the Care Teams. The Care Teams lay ministry is one way in which members of the congregation have opportunity to practice their faith in response to God's call to love and care for each other.

The chimes heard during the prelude at 11:00 worship were recently purchased by the Children and Family Committee and the Music Department. These chimes were introduced at an outdoor worship service at Family Camp this spring and will be used by the Children's Choirs in the fall.

Each gift of \$100 to the Summer Day offering makes it possible for one student from Cabrini-Green or another economically disadvantaged neighborhood to participate in the full-day academic and fine arts Summer Day program. Held at Fourth Church from July 11 to August 5, Summer Day, a program of Chicago Lights at Fourth Presbyterian Church, serves 100 children each year. Special Summer Day offering envelopes are available in the pew racks.

Other Worship and Prayer Opportunities at Fourth Church

A Vespers Communion service is held each Sunday evening at 6:30 p.m. in the sanctuary.
