The beginning of the prelude is a call to silent, personal preparation for the worship of God.



Two latest two banners in the Unweavings[®] series by Jewish fiber artist Laurie Wohl were installed early this summer, on the hymnboard pillars roughly halfway back in the sanctuary. From a distance the banners look subtle and understated, but close-up inspection reveals a detailed symphony of colors, textures, lively figures, and polished beads.

The texts featured on the two newest banners are "O sing to the Lord a new song. . . . O worship the Lord in the beauty of holiness" (Psalm 96) and "There is a river, whose streams make glad the city of God" (Psalm 46).

Calligraphy—both English and Hebrew—is used in all of the hangings to augment the formal and pictographic narratives. The ancient biblical text and Hebrew language together convey a quality of timelessness and continuity of story, and the forms and arabesques in the Hebrew language contribute an art form in themselves. The English lettering style seen in the banners suggests the iconography in the transept ceilings of Fourth Church.

The use of Hebrew in the hangings also promotes the Christian–Jewish dialogue that continues between two congregations that share a close relationship: Fourth Presbyterian Church and Chicago Sinai Congregation. Chicago Sinai holds its High Holy Day services in the Fourth Church sanctuary, at which time the banners and parament are part of the worship setting.

The bulletin cover depicts the seed of new life, in the form of acorns. This handcarved stone on the north wall of the chancel dates from 1914, the year of Fourth Church's construction and dedication.
