Our love and concern for the church are deeply connected to our love and concern for the world. . . . The world, like the church, has experienced intense conflict.

In a world of divisiveness and violence, it is essential for those who confess Jesus Christ as Lord to show the reason for the hope that is within us by dealing differently with one another. The church has been called to a transformed way of living. Today, especially, as Jews, Christians, and Muslims—the children of Abraham—are as much enmeshed as any other people in ongoing conflict in the world, our prayer to the God of Abraham is to hasten the day of messianic peace and to enable the Presbyterian Church to be an instrument to that end.



Fourth Presbyterian Church Sanctuary Improvements

The sanctuary enhancements being undertaken as part of Project Light are underway. This past week, floor preparation work continued. Next week pews will begin to be installed in the balconies.

The sanctuary improvement project includes the installation of a new sound system, new flooring under the pews, and new pews, which will be exact replicas of the pews that were installed in 1914, down to the detailed end carvings. The new pews also will provide improved ergonomics as well as greater access for those with disabilities.

During this construction phase, the pipe organ has been wrapped and sealed to protect it from dust. A temporarily installed electronic organ is being used in its place.

Bids can be placed during Coffee Hour on the thirteen original pews available by auction. The auction of the ten pews in as-is condition will conclude next Sunday. The auction of the three pews in quality condition and the pew ends will conclude the night of February 24 at the Mission Benefit. Small wooden crosses, made from the wood from the original pews, can be presordered through March 15. Order forms are available during Coffee Hour and in the literature racks.

BAPTISM AT FOURTH PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

On the second Sunday of each month, Fourth Church includes the Sacrament of Baptism in morning worship. Baptism is the sign and seal of God's grace and covenant in Christ.
