

### Facing page

Carvings on the west wall of Stone Chapel depict the four evangelists—Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John—and their symbols, held by angels (winged man, winged lion, winged ox, and eagle). The bottom row depicts Peter, Stephen, Paul, and Timothy.

The chapel was dedicated in 1931 in honor of John Timothy Stone, who served as pastor of Fourth Church from 1909 to 1930 and oversaw the church's move to its current location on Michigan Avenue in 1914. The presence of three of the carvings in Stone Chapel is explained in part by the nominating motion for Stone as moderator of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) in May, 1915: "[This] candidate has the tenderness of *John*, the evangelistic spirit of Timothy, and the strength of *Peter*" (since most of those present knew that "Peter" is Greek for "stone," the nominee's identity was revealed).

The bulletin cover: This carved wooden angel can be found at the base of the organ case on the south wall of the choir loft (to the left as you face the front of the church). The Fourth Church organ dates from 1971; an Aeolian/Skinner, it is one of the largest in the Midwest and incorporates pipework from the original instrument of 1914. Most of its 6,603 pipes are in the area south of the choir loft, although two of the seven divisions are located in a separate organ loft at the rear of the church, above the large east window.
