Certainly, God remains "the Lord," sovereign in all ways. Nonetheless, God is also "our Lord," a divinity we can imagine holding shares in our enterprises, caring what happens to us. Is any thought more consoling? What are human beings that God should care for us? . . . These are deep matters, ultimate mysteries, driving to the roots of what it means to be human. If we derive from the providential will of a God all-powerful and all-good, then our lives may make great sense, despite their apparent chaos. If God holds our hand, then even though we walk through the valley of the shadow of darkness, we may fear no evil.


