During Today's Worship

IN THE DETAILS



The Great East Window in the Fourth Presbyterian Church sanctuary was designed and made by renowned stained glass artist Charles J. Connick of Boston and dedicated in 1930. Also known as the Nettie Fowler McCormick Memorial Window, it illustrates the growth of Christianity from the four major prophets through the four evangelists, accompanied by the commanding figures of Peter and Paul.

Shown on this page is the evangelist Saint Matthew, who stands in the first opening of the window, at the left. (The identification “Saint Matthew” appears above his head.) The panel below him (*upper right*) portrays the parable of the wedding attendants who did not know at what hour the bridegroom would come (Matthew 25:1–13). Below that is the prophet Isaiah, seated with scroll and staff.

The weekend of July 28–August 4, Senior Highs will travel to Hazard, Kentucky, where they will build and repair homes with the Hazard/Perry County Housing Development Alliance. John Buchanan is preaching today in Colorado at Hyde Chapel at Estes Park Center YMCA of the Rockies. Yesterday he participated in the dedication ceremony of the John Timothy Stone Mountainside Christian Faith and Life Center there, named after Dr. Stone, who served Fourth Presbyterian Church as Pastor from 1909 to 1930.

Each gift of \$150 to the Summer Day offering makes it possible for one student from Cabrini-Green or another economically disadvantaged neighborhood to participate in the six-week, full-day academic and fine arts Summer Day program. Held at Fourth Church from June 18 to July 27, Summer Day, a program of Chicago Lights at Fourth Presbyterian Church, serves 120 children each year. Special Summer Day offering envelopes are available in the pew racks.
