During Today's Worship

Large-print bulletins, Bibles, and hymnals and individual listening devices for improved sound are available in the back of the sanctuary. Worship also can be heard through the "T" setting of hearing aids.

If your infant or small child needs care during the worship service, you may leave the sanctuary and return as you wish. The worship service audio can be heard in Stone Chapel, where you and your child are also welcome. 

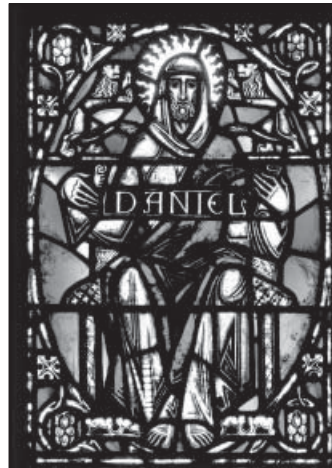
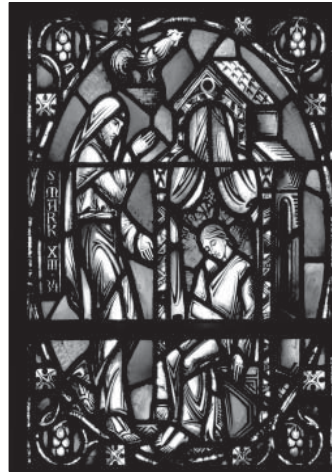

IN THE DETAILS



The Great East Window in the Fourth Presbyterian Church sanctuary was designed by Charles J. Connick and given to the church in 1930 by the children of Nettie Fowler McCormick, widow of reaper inventor Cyrus McCormick. The McCormick family contributed almost half of the funds for building the Michigan Avenue sanctuary and facilities. The bottom of the window panels reads “In Loving Memory of Nettie Fowler McCormick 1835–1923.”

Shown on this page is the third window panel from the left, in which Saint Mark is depicted at the top of the panel, with a winged lion (the symbol for Mark) and the identification “Saint Mark” above his head. Below him (*upper right*) is a representation of the New Testament parable about watchfulness in which a journeying householder’s time of return is unknown (Mark 13:33–37). Below that sits the Old Testament prophet Daniel, chosen as the prototype of Mark.

Worship Notes

Fourth Church welcomes to its pulpit this morning Deborah Kapp, Professor of Urban Ministry at McCormick Theological Seminary. Dr. Kapp also served as Associate Pastor at Fourth Church from 1981 to 1991.

Today's anthem was composed by Giovanni Pierluigi da Palestrina (1525–1594), who was organist and choirmaster for several churches in Rome, including the Sistine Chapel. His music is marked by flowing, smooth lines and a rich beauty of sound.

The men of the Morning Choir are providing musical leadership during the month of August. The full choir will return in September. Anyone interested in participating in an adult or children's choir is encouraged to contact John Sherer at the church at 312.981.3592.

The four seven-foot handcarved angels depicted on the bulletin cover grace the tops of the piers in the nave of the sanctuary. Many hold musical instruments mentioned in the hymn of praise, Psalm 150 (page 551, O.T.). They serve as a reminder of the invitation to praise God, in word and song, in thought and deed, in the sanctuary and, indeed, in all of life.
