

Louis Vierne



was designed and made by renowned stained glass artist Charles J. Connick of Boston and dedicated in 1930. Also known as the Nettie Fowler McCormick Memorial Window, it illustrates the growth of Christianity from the four major prophets through the four evangelists, accompanied by the commanding figures of Peter and Paul.

Shown on this page is the fifth window panel from the left, in which Paul stands atop a representation (upper right above) of the New Testament parable of the Good Samaritan (Luke 10:29–27) and the Old Testament story of the eagle and the noble vine (Ezekiel 17).

"Final" from *Symphonie I*, today's postlude, was composed by Louis Vierne (1870– 1937), organist of Notre Dame Cathedral in Paris from 1900 to 1937. Born blind, Vierne nevertheless toured America and Europe extensively as an organ recitalist and also composed six symphonies for the organ. Today's postlude, from his first symphony is in the style of a French toccata brimming over with exhilarating joy.

Today's Prayer of Thanksgiving and Dedication is taken from *Flames of the Spirit: Resources for Worship* (1985).

The steeple of Fourth Presbyterian Church, shown on the bulletin cover, was one of the tallest structures on Michigan Avenue when the church was built in 1913. The tower was renovated and reinforced in the 1980s.
