When I think of the future, when I think of heaven, when I think of the end of the age as we know it, I think of the loving, gracious, generous God in whose hands it all rests and I am glad, even delighted, that this God is far more generous than many of his most ardent worshipers and preachers. We Christians need a bigger God that goes against the conventional wisdom of our faith. With such a God we need fear nothing that the future has to offer, and before that time comes and ends, we might emulate that generosity of God in our own affairs.





IN THE DETAILS







The Great East Window in the Fourth Presbyterian Church sanctuary was designed and made by renowned stained glass artist Charles J. Connick of Boston and dedicated in 1930. Also known as the Nettie Fowler McCormick Memorial Window, it illustrates the growth of Christianity from the four major prophets through the four evangelists, accompanied by the commanding figures of Peter and Paul.

Shown on this page is the fifth window panel from the left, in which Paul stands atop a representation (upper right above) of the New Testament parable of the Good Samaritan (Luke 10:29–27) and the Old Testament story of the eagle and the noble vine (Ezekiel 17).

Worship Notes

Fourth Church welcomes to its pulpit this morning Peter J. Gomes, who has served in the Memorial Church of Harvard University since 1970. Dr. Gomes is also a member of the Harvard faculty, where he is Plummer Professor of Christian Morals. Widely regarded as one of America's most distinguished preachers, Dr. Gomes is also the author of several best-selling books, including *The Good Book: Reading the Bible with Mind and Heart; The Good Life: Truths that Last in Times of Need;* and *Strength for the Journey: Biblical Wisdom for Daily Living.*

Today's prelude was composed by John Knowles Paine (1839–1906), who began teaching music at Harvard University in 1862 and was appointed organist of Appleton Chapel on the Harvard campus. In 1875, while still at Harvard, Paine became the first full professor of music at any American university. Paine was one of the finest American organists of his time and was among the first organists able to play the complete organ works of Johann Sebastian Bach, not then widely known.

The steeple of Fourth Presbyterian Church, shown on the bulletin cover, was one of the tallest structures on Michigan Avenue when the church was built in 1913. The tower was renovated and reinforced in the 1980s.
