I do not think we are in a very good situation historically. I do not believe our relationship to the earth is liable to change for the better until it gets catastrophically worse. Our record indicates that we can walk with our eyes wide open straight into sheer destructiveness if there is a profit on the way. . . . I have no great expectations that human cussedness will somehow be quickly modified and turned into generosity or that humanity's care of the earth will improve much.

But I do go around planting trees on the campus.



BAPTISM AT FOURTH PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH
