In the New Testament Jesus Inspires Love, Hatred, and Fear but never boredom. The political and religious authorities conspire to kill him. He challenged some of his contemporaries' most basic assumptions about God and how to live one's life, and he continues to challenge many of the most pervasive assumptions of our culture. He particularly welcomed the outcasts and oppressed of his society into his company. He calls on those who would follow him to take risks. Many imagine the Bible a conservative book that comforts those who want to preserve the status quo. But the Jesus it presents shook up his society and would shake up ours.



### WORSHIP NOTES

This morning's Offertory Anthem, "In Splendenti Nube," with elaborate entrances cascading downward and the words "Hic est Filius meus" ("This is my Son"), dramatically reflects the voice of the Holy Spirit coming from the clouds. Composer Peter Philips was born in London in 1560, but being Catholic during the tumultuous years of reformation in England, fled to Paris and Madrid and eventually settled in Antwerp.

The textile banners and pulpit parament, "Unweavings" created by Laurie Wohl, were commissioned by Fourth Church for use during the liturgical season of Ordinary Time, the longest season of the church year (the season between Epiphany and Lent and between Pentecost and Advent).

**Bulletin cover:** Since Fourth Church was dedicated in May 1914, more than six million worshipers have passed under this twelve-foot-wide tympanum over the Michigan Avenue entrance. The carving depicts Aaron blessing the children of Israel, as he was instructed by God in Numbers 6:23–26.
