During Today's Worship

to receive Communion, which is served by intinction. The congregation will come forward by the center aisle to receive the bread (gluten-free bread is available in the paper "cup" within the basket of bread), which they will then dip into the chalice of nonalchoholic grape juice. Worshipers will return to their pews by the side aisles.
