



IN THE DETAILS



The Great East Window in the Fourth Presbyterian Church sanctuary illustrates the growth of Christianity from the four major prophets through the four evangelists, accompanied by the commanding figures of Peter and Paul. Also known as the Nettie Fowler McCormick Memorial Window, it was designed and made by renowned stained glass artist Charles J. Connick of Boston and dedicated in 1930.

Shown on this page is the fifth window panel from the left, in which Paul stands atop a representation (upper right above) of the New Testament parable of the Good Samaritan (Luke 10:29–27) and the Old Testament story of the eagle and the noble vine (Ezekiel 17).

WORSHIP NOTES

- **One of this morning's composers, Thomas Tallis** (1505–1585), was an English church musician who lived through the turbulent Reformation period. He worked closely with four monarchs—Henry VIII, Edward VI, Queen Mary, and Elizabeth I. Elizabeth I granted Tallis a twenty-one-year monopoly on printing all music in England.
- **The women of the Morning Choir** will be singing during morning worship services in July. The men of the Morning Choir will sing in August, and the full choir will return in September.
- The textile banners and pulpit parament, "Unweavings," created by Laurie Wohl, were commissioned by Fourth Church for use during the liturgical season of Ordinary Time, the longest season of the church year (the season between Epiphany and Lent and between Pentecost and Advent). Through their combination of scripture texts and image, these banners celebrate and elevate the perception of the sacred in the "ordinary" as we make our faith journey day to day.
- **The bulletin cover photo** shows the view up the steps leading to the Fourth Church pulpit. The cover quote is from Garrison Keillor's *Life among the Lutherans*.
