

IN THE DETAILS



The Fourth Church labyrinth, which is made of limestone tiles set into the floor of Buchanan Chapel, is a modified version of the medieval labyrinth pattern in Chartres Cathedral in France. This walking tool for prayer and meditation focuses mind, body, and spirit on following a single path that leads to and returns from the center.

The labyrinth is typically available for walking at the following times, although it is best to call the church office to confirm the chapel is not being used for another event:

Mondays and Tuesdays: 7:30 a.m. to 9:00 p.m.

Wednesdays: 7:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Saturdays: 7:30 a.m. to 12:00 noon

WORSHIP NOTES

Charles Ives (1874–1954) composed "Variations on 'America" in 1891 while he was organist at the First Baptist Church in Danbury, Connecticut, his hometown. The piece was mostly forgotten about until the late 1950s when organist E. Power Biggs asked the family of Charles Ives about it. The music had been placed in a barn in Connecticut and nearly lost, but Biggs played it on one of his weekly radio shows. As a result, "Variations on 'America" became one of the most beloved pieces ever written for the organ.

The women of the Chancel and Morning Choirs will be singing in worship through July 14, and the men of the choirs will then sing through September 1.

The textile banners and pulpit parament, "Unweavings," created by Laurie Wohl, were commissioned by Fourth Church for use during the liturgical season of Ordinary Time, the longest season of the church year (the season between Epiphany and Lent and between Pentecost and Advent). Through their combination of scripture texts and images, these banners celebrate and elevate the perception of the sacred in the "ordinary" as we make our faith journey day to day.

The bulletin cover photo depicts the base of one of the stone pillars in the south aisle of the Sanctuary. The cover quote is the first verse of the "Battle Hymn of the Republic," the lyrics of which were written in 1861 by Julia Ward Howe.
