

Welcome to Worship at Fourth Presbyterian Church

We are grateful for your presence and invite you to participate in the worship, program, and service life of Fourth Church.

During Today's Worship

Large-print bulletins, Bibles, and hymnals are available in the Narthex. Worship also can be heard through the "T" setting of hearing aids.

Individual listening devices for improved sound are also available from ushers.

- If your infant or thild needs care or becomes disruptive during the worship service, you may leave the Sanctuary and return as you wish. Child care for infants through two-year-olds is provided in the Nursery on the first floor of the Gratz Center. The Hospitality Suite on the second floor is also available for parents and infants. See an usher for directions.
- **Worship folders**, containing quiet activities and a bulletin designed for children, are available from the ushers outside the south transept doors, between the Sanctuary and Anderson Hall, and in the Narthex, at the back of the Sanctuary.
- **During the Concerns of the Church,** please pass the pew information pads, so that all worshipers have an opportunity to provide updated information and to greet one another by name following the service.
- Please turn off all cell phones when in the Sanctuary.

If You Are New to Fourth Church

- Please wear a lapel pin, found in the pew racks, so we may greet you after worship.
- We invite you to stop by Coffee Hour after worship for fellowship, conversation, and information about church programs and volunteer opportunities.
- Parking is available on Sundays at 900 North Michigan (access from Rush or Walton Street) at the rate of \$8. Validation tickets for the 900 garage must be picked up during morning Coffee Hour or from the Chestnut Street reception desk. Discounted parking at the Hancock garage, 875 North Michigan, is available on Sunday mornings only at the rate of \$8 between 7:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. and only for three hours in that period. Hancock tickets must be validated in the Narthex.
- A tour of the organ begins at 12:15 p.m. at the front of the Sanctuary.
- A thurth tour begins at 12:15 p.m., starting at the back of the Sanctuary.
- Inquirers' Class explores Presbyterian history and beliefs. This one-session class is also a prerequisite for membership and includes a light meal. or shrink from probing things unknown lest God should not be there.


The way to God is not escape, though truth does make us free:



When in May 1909 Forty-Year-Old John Timothy Stone moved from Baltimore to Chicago to accept the call to be Pastor of Fourth Presbyterian Church, he was focused on the future.

Stone had, in fact, turned down the initial entreaties from the Pastor Nominating Committee of Fourth Church, challenging them to commit to building "a new and better-equipped edifice." (The congregation was for the most part content worshiping in a solid but uninspired church they had built thirty-five years earlier—after the Chicago Fire—on the northwest corner of Rush and Superior Streets.) It was only after Fourth Church had committed a significant sum of money—including a crucial 1:2 matching challenge from the family of reaper-inventor Cyrus McCormick—to building a new church campus that Stone changed his mind and accepted the call to be Pastor here.

It didn't take long for Stone to realize the first of his big goals: in May 1914, exactly five years after his arrival, the spectacular new facility was completed, dedicated, and immediately put to use. The church had employed one of the world's premier architects of the Gothic idiom—Ralph Adams Cram, best known for his work on the Cathedral of St. John the Divine in New York—to design the Sanctuary, with the renowned Howard Van Doren Shaw in charge of the ancillary buildings.









As important as the style of the buildings was their function. In addition to providing a place for worship, Stone and the congregation were committed to offering a "home away from home" for the thousands of single working people in the community—20,000 living within a few blocks of the church, one survey found. The completion of the Parish House buildings was the realization of the goal to provide "an inviting environment" that would serve the physical, social, and educational well-being of neighbors through the Young Women's Club, the Men's Club, and the Boys' and Girls' Clubs.

All photos at the top of this page were taken inside Fourth
Church soon after the 1914 campus was completed and
show typical activities of the time. Clockwise from upper
left: a women's cooking ("domestic science") class; a women's
physical-fitness class in the second-floor gymnasium
(long gone); a men's gathering to play the billiard-like
game "cue roque" (the billiard tables are also long gone);
and an evening men's business-skills class.

The bulletin cover photograph was taken soon after the completion of Fourth Church in May 1914. The address at the top of the cover was how the church referred to its location in 1914; "Lincoln Park Boulevard" was the term then used for the road that is now North Michigan Avenue and the inner Lake Shore Drive.



Nothing provides more incentive to finish a home-improvement project than does an impending visit from guests! The Moderator of the PC(USA) General Assembly, our own John Timothy Stone, had committed to holding that annual gathering at "his" newly finished church, so on May 21, 1914, almost 900 delegates

from around the country arrived at Fourth Church for the weeklong conference. This photograph—on display in the Loggia—was taken on Delaware Place with a panoramic camera (hence the curved-looking church). The apartment block at left is where the Hancock is now; at right is the view west on Delaware.

Ensuring Our Legacy

The generations that have gone before us have left us a vibrant legacy, not only in the bricks and mortar of the Sanctuary and Parish House buildings but also in the financial foundation from which we carry forth our ministry. It was the \$25,000 that remained after the completion of the 1914 building project that began the Fourth Church endowment fund.

Just as we carry on the work of the church today, so too we are committed to passing on the legacy of that ministry for future generations. We are grateful to the following persons who have included Fourth Presbyterian Church in their estate plans, helping to ensure the continued vitality of this church from one generation to the next.
