During Advent we ready our hearts to encounter the coming light of Christ. The scriptures tell us that Christ's coming will be like the coming of summer, but that even before his coming, we will see signs like leaves on the trees.

Through our prayers this season, we invite you to participate with us in preparing for Jesus to enter our lives again. Instead of using our usual prayer cards, we will be offering our Advent prayers in a new way: we will fill out green prayer cards with **prayers of expectation (things we are asking of God) and prayers of transformation (things for which we give thanks to God)**. We will build a tree with these prayers throughout the season, using the prayers as leaves that show signs of Christ coming into the world.

## **During Today's Worship**

All are encouraged to use the prayer card, found in this worship bulletin, to offer joys and/or concerns. If you have a prayer you would rather not share during worship, you are invited to complete a prayer card found by one of the prayer boxes in the Narthex, at the back of the Sanctuary, and it will be passed on to Judith Watt, Associate Pastor for Pastoral Care.

**All, including children, are invited to the Lord's Table** to receive Communion, which is served by intinction.

The congregation will come forward by the center aisle to receive the bread (gluten-free bread is available in the paper "cup" within the basket of bread), which they will then dip into the chalice of nonalcoholic grape juice. Worshipers will return to their pews by the side aisles.

The large banners hanging in the middle of the Sanctuary were created by liturgical artist Shawna Bowman during the 4:00 worship service and are artistic representations of our worship experience.
