

TODAY'S MINUTE FOR DISCIPLESHIP is presented by Craig Endicott on behalf of "Called to Be a Church Alive," the 2018 Annual Appeal for Fourth Presbyterian Church and Chicago Lights.

TODAY IS REFORMATION SUNDAY, a day when we recall the rich heritage of the Protestant tradition. The Presbyterian Church (USA) grew out of the Reformation of the sixteenth century under leaders such as John Calvin and John Knox. It was 500 years ago this week, on October 31, 1517, that Martin Luther posted his ninety-five theses on the church door in Wittenberg, Germany, the watershed event sparking the Reformation. Luther later authored the hymn "A Mighty Fortress Is Our God," sung in today's service and featured in the Postlude. Reformation Sunday is also a day when we remember and give thanks for Reformation leaders and all others who have kept the faith.

As we mark the 500th anniversary of the Reformation this autumn, we continue our seven-part "Always Reforming" sermon series. Each week we are also affirming our faith by using different creeds and statements of faith from the Reformed tradition. Today's affirmation is from the Confession of 1967.
