Holy Week and Easter

The 12:10 p.m. service will include opportunity for those who are interested to participate in foot or hand washing. The evening Tenebrae service portrays the progression from light to darkness in the passion of Jesus.
- A Good Friday program for children will be held March 30 at 5:30 p.m. in the chapel.

- On Good Friday, March 30, Rocky Supinger will preach at the 12:10 p.m. service. The 7:30 p.m. choral service, sung by the Morning Choir, will feature Domenico Scarlatti's *Stabat Mater*.
- A Good Friday Walk in the Cabrini-Green neighborhood with fellow members of the Near North Ministry Alliance takes place Friday, March 30 from 3:00 to 5:00 p.m., beginning at Seward Park (375 W. Elm).
- A Saturday Easter Vigil will be held on March 31, beginning at 8:00 p.m. in the Michigan Avenue courtyard with the kindling of a fire to provide candlelight to carry into the darkened Sanctuary. As Easter draws near, the Sanctuary light increases and we reaffirm our baptismal vows and celebrate the Lord's Supper.
- Easter Sunday services on April 1 will include a Sunrise Service at 6:30 a.m. at Oak Street Beach; 8:00, 9:30, and 11:30 a.m. worship; and our 4:00 p.m. Easter jazz service. An Easter program for children will take place at 9:30 a.m. on Gratz Floor 4.
- Our Easter Brunch for all ages—with a menu of ham, bacon, waffles, scrambled eggs, hash browns, fresh fruit, Danish, orange juice, and hot coffee and tea—will be served at 12:30 p.m. in Borwell Dining Room on Easter Sunday, April 1. During Today's Worship

All are encouraged to use the prayer card, found in this worship bulletin, to offer joys and/or concerns. The cards will be collected during the Sharing of Gifts (simply place the card in the offering plate as it is passed). The prayer requests will be read by the pastoral staff during the week.

All, including children, are invited to the Lord's Table to receive Communion, which is served by intinction. The congregation will come forward by the center aisle to receive the bread (gluten-free bread is available in the paper "cup" within the basket of bread), which they will then dip into the chalice of nonalcoholic grape juice. Worshipers will return to their pews by the side aisles.

Worship also can be heard through the "T" or "T-coil" setting of hearing aids.

Please silence all electronic devices when in the Sanctuary.

If your infant or small child needs care during the worship service, you may leave the Sanctuary and return as you wish. There is also an area in the left-side aisle where your child can play quietly.

Worship folders, containing quiet activities, are available from a greeter.
