We are glad to have you with us today and hope you will explore the many opportunities for learning, serving, and community building at Fourth Church! * Inspired by the radical hospitality of Jesus Christ, we welcome everyone, without exception, into the life of this congregation. * We invite you to join us at this intersection of faith and life as we share God's grace with one another and the world through worship and ministries of healing, reconciliation, and justice.



Today is **Dedication Commemoration Sunday** at Fourth Presbyterian Church, declared by Pastor John Timothy Stone in 1914 to be observed on the third Sunday of each May. On Sunday, May 10, 1914, the Fourth Church congregation worshiped in the Michigan Avenue Sanctuary for the first time, having moved from its smaller facility on Rush at Superior. A series of dedicatory services were held the remainder of that week, and later that month, the new Sanctuary and Parish House buildings were host to the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church, including the assembly's communion service attended by more than 1,800 worshipers.



Today is also "Leave a Legacy" Sunday. The generations that have gone before us left a vibrant legacy, not only in the bricks and mortar of the Sanctuary and Parish House buildings but also in the financial foundation from which we carry forth our ministry. It was the \$25,000 that remained after the completion of the 1914 building project that began the Fourth Church endowment fund. * Just as we carry on the work of the church today, so too we are committed to passing on the legacy of that ministry for future generations. As we recognize **those who serve in leadership roles** here at Fourth Church, we give thanks for the ongoing ministry of **Shannon Kershner**, who five years ago, on May 18, 2014—on the centennial celebration of this Sanctuary—preached her first sermon as Pastor of Fourth Church. We look forward to continuing our discipleship journey side by side! * We also give thanks for the ministry of **Abbi Heimach-Snipes**, who after three years with us as a pastoral resident will this summer become associate rector at St. Christopher's Episcopal Church in Oak Park. Abbi's last Sunday with us will be June 2, when we will celebrate her at the fellowship gathering that follows Jazz at Four that day. * June 2 will also be the last Sunday **Shawn Fiedler** will be with us as Ministerial Associate for Worship, as he will be moving to Boston for his partner's new job. We will have time to express our gratitude to Shawn during morning Coffee Hour on June 2.



In addition to our Sunday morning services and Jazz at Four, we also come together as a worshiping community on Wednesdays for **Morning Prayer** to pray for members and those in need. * If you are interested in **serving as a greeter** to welcome Jazz at Four or 11:00 a.m. worshipers, please let us know!



Next Sunday, we will welcome **Father Elias Chacour** as our guest preacher at 9:30 and 11:00 a.m. Father Chacour, author of *Blood Brothers*, is internationally known for his work for reconciliation between Palestinians and Jews. * Our "Big Questions" sermon series—which this week asks "How can we be church with differing political views?"—will resume on June 2, when we consider "Will we recognize each other in heaven?" * This Friday evening at 7:30 p.m. we gather for our monthly candlelit **Taizé service**, with opportunity to take part in a **labyrinth walk** beforehand.
