Just as we lit candles on the Advent wreath to symbolize the light coming into the world through the birth of Christ, so now our extinguishing of candles points to the Lenten progression from light to the shadows of Good Friday and the crucifixion.

- You can **honor or memorialize a loved one** with a contribution toward the **Easter flowers** that will decorate the Sanctuary for our online Easter service. - Next Sunday is Palm/Passion Sunday. As we celebrate online with loud hosannas, we invite you to download, print, and color a palm from our website (www.bit.ly/palmcolor). Then take a photo of your palm, or of you and your palm, and share it on social media, tagging @FourthChurch. Together we can create a virtual crowd welcoming Jesus into Jerusalem!
- Our Palm Sunday celebration will lead us into Jesus' Passion and **Holy Week**. We hope you will join us online as we pause to observe those solemn days. Our **Maundy Thursday Tenebrae** service, with Communion, will take place online Thursday, April 1 at 7:30 p.m. Our online **Good Friday service** on Friday, April 2 at 7:30 p.m. will include the pastors sharing short meditations on the Seven Last Words of Christ. And the **Easter Vigil** on Saturday, April 3 will take place via Zoom at 8:00 p.m. and will include the celebration of Communion. (The vigil will take place only via Zoom; for the link, sign up at **www.bit.ly/eastervigil21**; all other services will be online at www.bit.ly/FPC worship, Facebook Live, and our YouTube channel.) We encourage you to have **bread and juice on hand** during worship on Thursday, Saturday, and Easter Sunday as we share in the Lord's Supper from our homes.
- Our **festive Easter service online** will include Communion as well as the joyous music of brass and organ, handbells and jazz, and the hymns of Easter. This online celebration of the resurrection takes place on Easter Sunday, April 4 at 11:00 a.m. We hope you and those you know will not only mark this and the Holy Week dates on your calendars but also **invite others to join us in worship online** as our journey takes us to the cross and eventually the empty tomb!

Worship Notes

TODAY'S MUSIC CENTERS AROUND JOHANN SEBASTIAN BACH, born on this day in 1685. The prelude, solos, and postlude were all written while Bach was Cantor at St. Thomas Church in Leipzig, Germany, from 1723 until his death in 1750. Bach is one of the most influential musicians ever to live and one of the greatest composers of all time. His music summed up all that came before it and changed all that came after it, and yet when he was hired to be the Cantor of St. Thomas Church the minutes of the meeting state he was their third choice and they "had to settle" on Bach since the other candidates turned them down.

- I love borders. I place them in my artwork so that I can break them. They set up a reiteration of balance; they allow for a secondary or tertiary focal point. They introduce a conversation. In this image, the border allows for variation in the foreground and separation in the sky. The wheat breaks through the border. The horizon continues past the border. What are the metaphors within this imagery?
- People are drawn to Jesus, drawn to love. I portray God's voice with cumulonimbus clouds, the clouds of thunderstorms. As they move upward toward the heavens, they become wheat and doves. The image incorporates a border representing the loving constraints that Jesus' ministry places on our lives and choices. What would Jesus do? Jesus would love.
- The wheat grows beyond the border of life; the wheat brings forth a standard of daring love. "Those who love their life lose it" (John 12:25). The wheat breaks the border; it dances with the voice of God. It is not cautious; it is not scarce. It is love.

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
